On page 32 of the August 2016 *Forum*, there is an article on "Concept Eight: Learning to delegate authority;" on page 29, there is an article on "Step Eight: Being willing and honest about my amends." I found these both to be helpful as I considered the topic for this month.

On Topic: Before I came into Al-Anon, I would take risks out of fear or disregard for my well being, but not very often for my own spiritual growth (the exception being coming to my first Al-Anon meeting). In Al-Anon, I received the support and knowledge I needed to take healthy risks, even if they made me feel very uncomfortable at first. One of the biggest risks I am learning to take is being vulnerable, open and honest with myself and others.

When I take on a new service position, I believe I am risking failure. When I share my true feelings I risk rejection. When I delegate and accept help, I risk not having control of the outcome. But in Al-Anon, I learned to have faith in a Higher Power, with whom there is no such thing as failure, rejection, or need to control outcomes.

Al-Anon is the best, and safest place I know of to practice taking risks that lead to my spiritual growth. There is no other place I'd rather be.

Thank you District 22 for a wonderful Fall Assembly. I enjoyed making new friends and reconnecting with friends from past Assemblies and Conventions.

- For many of us our orders for Al-Anon Faces Alcoholism 2017 have arrived. Last year, Al-Anon members distributed over 350,000 copies throughout the U.S., Canada, Bermuda, and Puerto Rico. Please help us continue to make this the most successful member-participation outreach project in our history! The deadline to order the second printing of "AFA 2017" is February 8th, 2017, 5 p.m. ET.
- Also, without member sharings, our most comprehensive annual public outreach magazine wouldn't be possible. Please consider writing a few words about either of the following (word count: 50-300) and submitting your writing for publication in AFA 2018:
 - Remember how difficult it was to go to your first meeting? What helped you take that first big step?
 - Did you hear anything early on that made you want to come back?

- There is also an Al-Anon faces Alcoholism Writer's Guide for Professionals. Al-Anon Family Group Headquarters, Inc. is seeking articles or brief statements from professionals for publication in the AFA 2018. Sharing sheets for both projects are on the members' website as well as the order forms for AFA. If you need help please contact me.
- While looking through our World Service Conference Summary 2016, I noticed that conference members were asked, "How can we encourage members and service arms to distribute Al-Anon Faces Alcoholism? What more can we do?" One response especially interested me. "Every quarter, we address envelopes in my home group for letters to lawyers, the juridical system, churches, hospitals, and treatment facilities. We put in a card for the Al-Anon Information Service (AIS) office and urge the professionals to contact us with questions. We notify our AIS the day we do that so they can look for an increase in calls. We also put Al-Anon Faces Alcoholism in the newcomer packet. We have received a good response." This seems like a great idea and I'm going to bring this idea to my home group. Think about doing the same and let me know how it goes.
- Pretty soon our new PSAs (public service announcements) will be coming out. They are about parents of young people who have a drinking problem and children affected by their parents drinking. This will be our first Alateen PSA. I will be in touch when I receive this information.
- Bob C., District 7 rep, along with Linda from District 7 had an Al-Anon table at a New York Recovery Conference held in Troy, N.Y. on August 31st. Bob said many people

stopped by to pick up information, to talk about Al-Anon, and to ask questions. Bob had available some of our hard cover books and sold quite a few. Thank you Bob and Linda for making all of this possible.

- I just found out that for many years Districts 8 and 22 have shared responsibility for covering an Al-Anon meeting at Hope House, which is a rehabilitation center for teens in Albany. The third Saturday of every month is family day and that is when the Al-Anon meeting is held. District 8 is responsible for covering January through June and District 22 is responsible for July through December. Currently Deb W. from District 8 and Nancy R. from District 22 are the contacts for Hope House. Those Districts supply Al-Anon literature that focuses on parents of alcoholics, and they also try to keep daily readers on hand. They are considering purchasing a table rack for Al-Anon literature to place in the family room.
- In District 10 we have someone willing to reach out to the TV stations regarding playing our PSA's. So far one station has agreed to do this.
- In our September 2016 Group e news there are two examples of Alateen Public
 Outreach Graphics. I've been working with Walt, our Alateen Coordinator for NYN, on putting together a flyer for Alateen using these graphics. Ann T. from Rochester put it altogether for us—thanks Ann. I'm hoping that we can get this flyer on the different AIS websites. I'll keep you posted.

Our topic for this month is "Taking Risks". I have a quote that I keep in one of my daily readers: "You must make a choice to take a chance or your life will never change". It seems to me that just about

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everything I do is a risk. Risk for me is taking chances—coming back to AI-Anon, asking someone to be my sponsor, sponsoring, sharing at meetings, getting involved in different service positions, being the minority voice in a group conscience. Life is full of risks and I'm grateful that I have the opportunity to take them. Let me know what is happening in your community.

I am preparing for a weekend with the teens at the New York North Alateen Conference (NYNAC). Mary Beth and I are working on the third section of the Alateen Training Module, and looking forward to giving a preview of the module to our teens at NYNAC, as well as any interested Al-Anon members attending the Fall Assembly. This module will serve as a valuable means for helping everyone to understand what the requirements are to become an AMIAS, our duties as an AMIAS to the teens, as well as how to start and oversee an Alateen group.

On September 10, I met with a several AMIAS's from several different Alateen Groups in NYN, as well as Diane C. our NYN Delegate, Leslie C. our NYNAC Coordinator and Pat H. our NYN Al-Anon Public Outreach Coordinator, The focus of the meeting was to look at the various methods provided by World Service to increase our outreach efforts for Alateen in NYN. Some of the items spoken about include:

- A press release that we can print in newspapers to make people aware of Alateen meetings within their communities
- A new Alateen poster that lists local contact information for teens and parents looking for help. The poster can be hung in schools, libraries, medical centers, churches, etc.
- Posting meetings in the Community Event Calendar of local newspapers.

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- Requesting our Al-Anon groups to invite the teens to come and chair one of their meetings. You will be astonished when you hear the wisdom that comes from their hearts.
- Developing a process that will strengthen the communication between our existing Alateen Groups. Not just seeing each other at NYNAC or conventions.

The group plans to meet on a quarterly basis at different locations. The next meeting will be Saturday, December 2; we are waiting to confirm a location in Rochester.

After NYNAC, the NYN Alateen Guidelines Committee will start meeting again to continue reviewing and updating our current guidelines. I have been researching and printing out the Alateen guidelines for various Al-Anon areas within the United States. One of the discussions will be to begin investigating the various methods and cost associated with conducting background checks for all AMIAS's in NYN. There will also be a new addition to the guidelines that will address the yearly recertification requirements for all AMIAS's. The goal of the committee is to have our guidelines updated and ready by the spring of 2017.

I hope everyone takes time to enjoy all of the beauty that autumn brings. Take a few moments every day to stop, look and listen to nature and your own heart. There is so much to be grateful for in our lives.

This year's NYNAC theme is *COURAGE*. The theme for Saturday night is a Masquerade Ball. Greatly needed contributions have been coming in. Funds have come in from individuals, groups, bookmark sales, bottle returns and previous fundraising. I will have some bookmarks for sale at the Fall Assembly. I will continue to do fundraising, so please don't think it is too late to donate.

The artwork for the tee shirts has been approved and is at the printer's. We are also taking orders for the NYNAC tee shirts. (This is a fundraiser.) The last day for placing an order is September 26th, and all orders must be paid in advance. Tee shirts are \$10.00 for S, M, L and XL and \$12 for XXL. Please be sure to order your size carefully, as refunds are not available. If you miss the deadline and think you may still want a shirt, contact me after NYNAC, and I will see what may be left. There are usually a few, but I am trying not to order extras this year.

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A contract for Vanderkamp has been negotiated for 30 attendees (adults and children). This was the smallest number we could negotiate and keep it affordable. We can add more if we need to. (I hope we need to.) The cost this year is \$125.00. This did not include the cost of the nurse or the office and art supplies needed to have this event. Fundraising done to date has covered the cost of the nurse. I am confident the donations from our members and groups will take care of the rest. Based on what has already come in, I am pretty sure this goal will be met.

There was a significant increase in price due to a new "linen policy" at Vanderkamp. They now supply all the linens, towels and washcloths, pillows and blankets. There was no movement on the part of Vanderkamp to charge us per set. They charge by the cottage, and it is non-negotiable, whether we use them or not. The deposit has been sent and our reservation is secure. The rest of the money must be paid by September 25th, which is why the deadline for paid registrations is September 20th.

I'll probably need her at times, but the last two issues didn't need her technical help, although my proofreaders will always have to clean up after me. **John O.**

I never was a big risk taker. I think it had to do with fear of the unknown. When the benefits of taking a risk outweighed the discomfort of remaining scared, depressed, and stagnating, I decided taking a risk might just be the better option. The first risk was reaching out for help. The second was actually choosing to listen to the answers provided once I reached out. The next risk was taking the leap and attending my second Al-Anon meeting, which was ten years after my first. After that meeting, the risk-taking became easier. I told myself; no big deal, just go to the next meeting, see what happens. You can always leave because you don't know these people, and at this point you have nothing to lose.

I learned that if I wanted to lessen the pain and look to a brighter future, I could take small risks at my own pace. Just like One Day at a Time, it was one risk at a time. Those baby steps of taking risks began to change my life, and became second nature. I found going to meetings wasn't that bad, and found people whose lives seemed so similar to mine, even though we had never met. I began to feel comfortable. One phrase that always resonates with me is "pain is inevitable, but suffering is optional." I didn't have to suffer alone anymore: I had choices and I could move at my own pace. Next group of risks came when I decided to go to the AIS meeting to find out what that was all about. Those AIS meetings eventually led to meeting people who attended the NYN Assembly meetings, and I felt encouraged to go as well. That was scary. One more risk taken by going back to the next assembly, and with each new assembly it got easier and I began meeting new friends through the action committee breakouts groups. I know you have either heard me say or read one of my articles referring to those new found friends as being my friends all along the Erie Canal, from Albany.....to Buffalo. All the joys of service from that first initial risk of reaching out for help and following through one risk at a time. Thanks, Higher Power for all the pushes and nudges along the way. Together we can make it.
