Thoughts From Our Area Chair:

Alateen is Al-Anon. We all hear this said, but do we really understand what it means? I understand it to mean that Alateen is part of Al-Anon, that it's the same program; the only difference is the age of the members. We are encouraged to use "AFG" when referring to our program, "Al-Anon Family Groups." To me, that is inclusive of all members of a family of an alcoholic. Alcoholism knows no boundaries; it affects all members of a family. Younger people feel the same things adults feel and should not be denied help because of age. I often wonder, if I had known about Alateen many years ago, how different my life may have been. Alateens are the future of Al-Anon, and don't we want our program around for those we love who haven't yet discovered Al-Anon?

To me, the phrase, "Alateen is Al-Anon," also means that if a teen comes to an Al-Anon meeting they should be welcomed as a member of Al-Anon, not told this meeting is not for them. A younger member can be encouraged to try an Alateen meeting if one is available nearby; however they should not be turned away. Tradition Three states, "The only requirement for membership is that there be a problem of alcoholism in a relative or friend." Tradition Five tells us that, 'Our groups have but one purpose, to help families of alcoholics." Neither tradition specifies age.

As "AFG" members, we need to think about what we as individuals can do to welcome and give comfort to younger family members of Alcoholics. In order for Alateen to survive, it needs help from Al-Anon members. That help means more than just in a financial capacity. I recently found out that in New York North

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(NYN) there are only nine, yes, I said "9" active Alateen meetings, actual meetings where kids are attending, with approximately 60-70 teens attending. As an Area, we need to put our thinking caps on, brainstorm and ask ourselves what WE can do to make Alateen, "Al-Anon." As individuals, we can reach out to Alateen meeting sponsors and support them. As districts, we can invite the Alateens to district meetings and gatherings. We can think about Public Outreach as it relates to the teenager who has been affected by someone's drinking. Teens hurt just as much as adults, and Alateen being available to teens might literally mean the difference between life and death. The next time you meditate, take a few moments to think about the reason you came to Al-Anon, and then think about what you can do to make sure Alateen is Al-Anon, and what you can do to help those younger members living with the effects of alcoholism. Have you ever heard an Alateen member share? They share the same things that are shared in Al-Anon meetings. They share from the heart and they express their feelings in a safe environment. They say what they feel and mean what they say. They too have been affected by someone's drinking and are suffering. Please use the articles in this newsletter to start the discussions in your groups about "Alateen is Al-Anon."

I hope you all have a wonderful holiday season and a great new year. Start planning for the Spring Assembly/Convention in May.

Alternate Delegate/Forum:

Each Month in the *Forum* magazine there is a section devoted to Alateen and how the Alateen has helped young people whose lives have been affected by Alcoholism. Alateen members and Alateen sponsors share their Experience, Strength and Hope through sharing what the Alateen Program has done for them. These articles are not just meant for the Alateen members, but are a tool to help all members of Al-Anon/Alateen with our recovery.

As I read these articles in the *Forum*, I am reminded that the topics are not just about things that teenagers experience, but are things that I hear about, or have heard others share in my Al-Anon meetings. It is as if they are right there sitting next to us as they share. They have some of the same feelings and thoughts about how alcoholism has effected their lives, and how they have found solutions to their problems through their meetings (just as we have).

As you read along, you will notice how our topics are very similar. Here are a few titles from some of this year's *Forum*: (Alateen topic in Bold and Al-Anon meeting after):

February: I learned to trust my Mom--again. (Trust is a big issue we hear about in our meetings. Trust is hard to do, because the loss of it was one of the things that brought us to the program.)

March: **The choice is clear when I am willing to listen.** (Making Choices-"Let Go and Let God").

April: **The Serenity Prayer is my moment of Silence. Using the Serenity Prayer to start our Day.** (Finding Serenity and Keeping it; Serenity does not show up one day and we keep it forever).

May: I am Grateful to be an Alateen Sponsor. (The Joys of Sponsorship-being a Sponsor or Sponsee has many rewards. *Sponsorship-What's it all about Pamphlet -M78*).

October: I learned how to deal with my emotions. (What my real emotions are and how to identify them; feelings are not facts).

Please feel free to submit your Al-Anon story to the *Forum*, and encourage your Alateen Member to write also (instructions can be found on the Al-Anon Website at <u>www.alanon.alateen.org</u>). Also, please do not skip this portion of the *Forum* because you will miss some real gems.

Dear NYN Friends,

Well, this is our last *NHL (Northern Hi Lights)* article for 2013. I can't believe that another year is almost over. As of December 31, I will have completed two years of my three-year term as Delegate! I have to say that this has been such a gift to me. It has allowed me to have a lot of contact with other Al-Anon members throughout all of New York North (NYN); contact with people I might never have met if not for this position; again, such a wonderful gift.

A couple weeks ago, I lead a workshop at the HMB AA Convention in Utica. The workshop was entitled, "If you want it, Here it is (Attracting Newcomers/Retaining members)." When I walked into the room, I did see many people whom I knew, but there were many more people whom I had not met before. It was really a treat to lead this workshop. I told the members there that I wanted to share some of my thoughts in my next *Northern Hi Light*'s article; that's what I am doing today.

While I shared a little of my thoughts on the theme of the workshop, most of what was discussed came from those who attended the workshop. Two questions were asked: 1. What brought you to your second meeting? 2. How does your group welcome a newcomer?

There was a lot of sharing on both questions. On the first question, some of the sharings included the happiness of those in the rooms; the acceptance of those in the rooms. People talked about phone numbers, calling people between the first and second meeting, having someone from that first meeting calling them during the week just to check in. Others shared about personal invitations to keep coming back. Of course, for some it was the hugs, for others the feeling of being home.

The second question brought just as lively a conversation on how groups and individuals welcome newcomers and also retain long-timers. Again, the personal invitation to be part of the group, to do service within the group or to use the phone numbers given. The hugs, the smiles and laughter of those in the meetings where all things that worked to welcome and encourage people to come back. Calling the newcomer between meetings, and calling the long-timer who you haven't seen in a while also help to keep people coming back. One of my personal favorites is the invitation for a cup of coffee either before or after a meeting.

As I listened to people share that Saturday afternoon, I realized that those things that brought people to their second meeting where just what groups and individuals were doing. Seems so simple, but sometimes we do overlook the forest for the trees. I know, for me, I just need to be reminded of the basics. I was so happy with how the workshop turned out.

This month's theme is "Alateen is Al-Anon." I shared a lot last month on Alateen and NYNAC. After attending meetings with the Alateens, I saw how true this statement is. They are trying to deal with living with or caring for an alcoholic the same as me. They are using the same tools as I am: meetings, CAL, sponsors and the phone, the same as me. I need to let go of my prejudices and just listen. I have learned a lot from listening to the Alateens.

Topic: "Courage to change the things we can"

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Immediate Past Delegate:

When I began to think about the topic for this month's sharing, I knew that I would need to go back in our history and see how Alateen evolved from Al-Anon. So I went searching in *Many Voices, One Journey* to learn how this happened. What we know about our early history is that the family members of those early alcoholics would often meet in another room, and after a time came to realize that the Twelve Steps the alcoholics were practicing so that they could have sobriety, would also work for the family members as they tried to recover from the effects of living with the disease of alcoholism. The teens were always welcome in these early meetings.

Alateen's early beginnings started in 1956, when a 17-year old named Robert from Pasadena, California, wrote to the Al-Anon Family Group Headquarters explaining what the teens were doing and why. They called it Alateen (See 74-75 of *Many Voices, One Journey*).

If we go to the "Policy" section of the *Service Manual*, pg. 77, "Membership and Groups," the very first topic is "Membership Eligibility." Here, it is stated that, "anyone who feels his personal life is or has been deeply affected by close contact with a problem drinker is eligible for membership in Al-Anon/Alateen."

Also, if we look at the wording of the Twelve Steps, they are identical. In the Twelve Traditions, there are only slight word changes to reflect each part of our program. Even the literature reflects the perspective of the teen and passes through the Conference Approved Literature (CAL) process; and the sharings of teens are included in our monthly *Forum* magazine.

I think it's important in our present day to be more cognizant of these facts as we struggle to have good, well attended, Alateen meetings; and where there are no Alateen meetings, we need to be open to welcoming the Alateens into our Al-Anon meetings. At the 2010 World Service Conference, there was a presentation by a "Thought Force" whose charge was to look at "Integrating Alateen into Al-Anon Where No Alateen Meeting Existed." The committee developed a number of strategies to aide us in making this possible. The strategies were divided into three major themes: Education and Training, Fellowship Outreach and Public Outreach. The presentation of these strategies was followed by discussion from the conference floor as to what they liked and didn't like of the strategies. For more details of this presentation see pgs. 47-49 of the 2010 World Service Conference Summary. This can be seen and downloaded from the member site of the World Service Office.

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One of the tools that was developed and sent to all registered groups, which supports this idea, is the **Alateen Table Card (M-80)**, which reminds Al-Anon members that Alateen is available for their children. When there are so many Al-Anon members who have been blessed with recovery in the Al-Anon program; why would they not want the same for their children? We need to ask this question of our members and encourage them to help this happen; alcoholism is a family disease.

Are Alateens welcome at your Al-Anon meeting? If not; why not? Alateen is Al-Anon.

Hi Everyone,

I am happy to share with you another exciting announcement, our second e-book:

> Al-Anon's basic book, How Al-Anon Works for Families & Friends of Alcoholics, is now available as an ebook from the Apple iTunes store. It can be read on Apple computers and iPhones. The book (eB-22) is priced at \$14.99.

This announcement is informational only, and is not an endorsement of Apple computer and its products. Due to a combination of business and technology issues, the electronic version of How Al-Anon Works is available only from the Apple iTunes store at this time. Other e-book vendors may offer an electronic version of How Al-Anon Works at a later date. This announcement was made with the approval of Al-Anon's Policy Committee, which recognized at its October 2013 meeting that there was no other way to announce the availability of this e-book without stating specifically where the e-book could be acquired. In June 2012, the Policy Committee reported to Conference members that using outside vendors to sell electronic Conference Approved Literature (CAL) reflects the realities of today's technology environment and is not an endorsement of, or affiliation with, an outside entity.

Our new updated Service Manual, 2014-2017 (P-24/27), is available in English on the Members' Website, www.al-anon.alateen.org/members. Spanish and French versions will be posted by year-end. Complimentary printed copies will be mailed to groups in early 2014.

The electronic version of *The Forum* is still a work in progress and, as soon as it is available, I will let you know.

Alateen is Al-Anon is our topic this month. In The "Suggested Alateen Preamble to the Twelve Steps" it states, "Alateen, part of the Al-Anon Family Groups, is a fellowship of young people whose lives have been affected by alcoholism in a family

member or close friend. We help each other by sharing our experience, strength, and hope." That is exactly what we did at our recent Day of Sharing for our District #29.

Area Secretary:

This past weekend, I traveled to Utica and attended the HMB Convention. District #6 did a great job of planning the program. In one of the morning panels, "Reaching for Higher Ground Spiritually in Al-Anon," three gentlemen shared their experience strength and hope. Their messages were filled with personal experiences with their Higher Power. In an afternoon panel, chaired by our delegate, "If You Want It, Here It Is -- Attracting Newcomers/Retaining Members," members shared their ideas on the topic. It was a day filled with "hugs" and ways to put our program to work for us. For me, this was Concept Four in action, "Participation is the key to harmony."

Topic this month: Alateen is Al-Anon. How did Alateen get its start? A 17-year-old named Robert started the first meeting for teenagers in Pasadena, California, in 1956. In the spring of 1957, Headquarters received many letters from teens requesting literature. Lois later shared that so many young people had written in to the office that a new section was needed. The name Alateen was suggested. The California Alateen groups submitted a pamphlet, *Youth and the Alcoholic Parent (P-21)*, for publication. Copies were mailed with every Al-Anon literature order to alert our membership about Alateen. Today there are 1,700 Alateen groups meeting in 115 countries.

I was not raised in an alcoholic home. There were, however, alcoholics in my extended family and alcohol played a major role in any family gathering. I remember a time when the relative hosting the gathering would put on the coffee and put away the beer. But, I did marry an alcoholic, and our children were raised in an alcoholic home! Alcoholism is a disease; it spreads through families making everyone sick. Our four children were teenagers when sobriety came to our house. Al-Anon helped me realize I had to let them go to make their own mistakes and face their own consequences. I also realized that they, too, had a program available to them: Alateen. Two chose to attend meetings on a regular basis. I am grateful for the comfort and wisdom they gained from Alateen. They learned to hold their heads high and not feel any shame about the disease that struck our home. But for them, Alateen and Al-Anon were separate programs.

Today, I encourage you to **take** your teens to Alateen meetings, but **invite** them to Al-Anon meetings with you! If we are to convince the teens that Alateen is Al-Anon, let's invite them in!

ALATEEN IS AL-ANON...I once said during a conference call with the Alateen Advisory Committee ...AL-ANON IS ALATEEN. What a cheer I got from the Alateens participating! In reality, no matter how we say it, we are one. AFG means "AL-ANON FAMILY GROUPS," and our focus is on recovery from the family disease of alcoholism. How do we do that? We have some amazing tools to work with...Our Legacies...the Steps, the Traditions and the Concepts. We have KBDM...Knowledge Based Decision Making. When information is provided, it is important that <u>all</u> information is given to <u>all</u> involved. Minority opinions and questions are important to the discussion. Respect for each other and the ability to listen and agree to disagree can make a difference.

Having to look at the bigger picture (what is best for the worldwide fellowship of Al-Anon Family Groups as a whole) helps me to implement the tools in my thought process. I absolutely don't get what I want every time...thank goodness for that! I do get what I need, whether I like the outcome or not. I don't always see the bigger picture. When it is revealed, I have one of those "aha" moments. HP (Higher Power) at work in my life once again.

We have an opportunity to "talk to each other and reason things out." I have often thought about a situation...What if I was blind? In a discussion, I would have to listen carefully to conversation. I would not be able to judge by what a person was wearing, what the age of that person was or any of the other factors that often are used when making an informed decision that is best for all. For too long, Al-Anon and Alateen conversations end up being "them" and "us."

I encourage *every member* to read the <u>New York North policy</u> on Alateen Requirements and Guidelines.

Black is original; red is what is being omitted and green is what is new. Such a simple thought on how recovery works.
