Web Coordinator – AWSC Report March 20, 2010

The NYN website was viewed by 1497 and 1322 unique visitors in January and February respectively. The most frequently viewed page is the meeting information page, which has been viewed 2800 times this year. The second most frequently viewed page is Western New York AIS' meeting schedule (745 times). Other popular pages include District 10's main page, Links, Northern Hi Lights, What happens at a meeting, About Al-Anon, Frequently asked questions, and AWSC meeting minutes. People are reaching our site from Google searches, WSO New York meeting page, usrecovery.info New York Al-Anon page, New York South website, the Albany area Al-Anon website, Bing searches as well as several other Al-Anon and recovery/health related sites.

Late last fall I renamed the "Meeting Information" link to "Find a Meeting" after speaking with an Al-Anon member who recently moved to New York State. It was suggested that that title meeting information could be misconstrued to mean what happens at a meeting. Renaming the link to find a meeting clearly identifies the page's purpose. In January the AWSC meeting minutes from 2009 were moved to an archived page, which is linked to from the AWSC meeting minutes page. The Northern Hi Lights page was slightly modified for the inclusion of both 2009 and 2010 issues.
