FACING THE GHOSTS OF OUR PAST

Setting: A local Al-Anon group is having its monthly business meeting. The Group Representative has recently attended a District meeting and is enthusiastically informing their group of the District happenings.

CAST

Narrator Group Representative Otto Thyme Noah Boo-Boo Vera Success Cat Tastrophy Carrie Noduty

Narrator stands in front of stage

Narrator:

Welcome to the Facing the Ghosts of Our Past Workshop. We are glad you are here. Now let me invite you to attend my home group's monthly business meeting. Even if this is not your home group, we would love for you to attend. After all, an informed group conscience is part of our spiritual program and the more voices the better!

Oh look, our Group Representative is just starting the meeting. He/She attended the monthly District meeting and has brought news for the group! [Move toward the side of the stage and freeze.]

Group Rep stands and speaks to all of the seated group members. Group Rep looks at each member as he/she refers to them. All group members freeze as Group Rep is speaking.

Group Rep:

Thank you for attending our group business meeting. I have lots of news from our District meeting. As you know, as your Group Representative I go to District to bring information back to our group as well as to share our voice. An informed group is a healthy group!

Well......... we have some positions open in District and as you know, Al-Anon's third legacy is Service. I want to share with you that when I got busy, I got better.

So on to the Open Service Positions. We need a District Representative, and Cat Tastrophy, I know you could do that.

We need a Public Outreach Coordinator and Vera Success, you would be awesome in that job.

Institutions Coordinator is open and Carrie Noduty, didn't you say that you loved lining up speakers? That sounds right down your alley.

Otto Thyme, I know that you just took Alateen training. An Alateen sponsor is needed for that new group that just opened up.

And Noah Boo-Boo, I know the perfect job for you, District Chair. So what do you all think? Aren't you just excited to get started? Any questions? [Stay standing and freeze]

Otto stands up and pleads

Otto Thyme:

Whenever I hear the word "service" in meetings, the word that almost always goes along with it is "work." Don't I have enough work already? I just took that Alateen Sponsor training because my Sponsor took it and I went along for the ride. Now you want me to actually sponsor a group???? [Sit back down and freeze]

Noah stands and speaks emphatically

Noah Boo-Boo:

Hmmm, District Chair? Well, I really want to give something back, because my program teaches me to say yes. But I don't know the first thing about what goes on outside my group. This fellowship is so huge, and so rich, and there's so much to know about how it works. My GR knows so much about it, and probably everybody else does too, except me! I don't know any of it! [Sit down and freeze]

Vera stands and whines

Vera Success:

You think I could be the Public Outreach Coordinator? Have you lost your mind? What if I volunteered to help out and actually succeeded? I don't want to feel responsible for the welfare of my whole group. [Sit down and freeze]

Cat stands and speaks hysterically

Cat Tastrophy:

Oh my goodness! You want me to do WHAT? Your want me to be a District Representative? I can't do that! I can't do anything right. [Sit down and freeze]

Carrie stands and speaks with disbelief

Carrie Noduty:

I'm too afraid to even chair a meeting. How can I apply for a service position and take on more responsibility if I can't even do the small stuff? Institutions Coordinator sounds like a difficult job and I don't even know where to start.

[Sit down and freeze]

Otto stands and speaks calmly and firmly

Otto Thyme: I'm afraid to commit to something else right now. I even have to skip my

meeting sometimes—I've just got so much to do and to think about and to work on, some days I just don't feel like going to a meeting. Will I lose that freedom and flexibility if I get involved in service? And what if I can't get to my regular meeting because of a service commitment? I don't want service

to interfere with my home group!

[Sit down and freeze]

Cat stands and speaks hysterically

<u>Cat Tastrophy:</u> I know that I was a Group Representative for three years, but I always had

my District Representatives to reason things out with. I am not as wise as

they are. I would be a total failure at this job!

[Sit down and freeze]

Vera stands and speaks In a whining voice

Vera Success: What if I begin to dominate and control the affairs of my group or become

distracted from my own recovery by all those business meetings I have to

attend?

[Sit down and freeze]

Carrie standing and speaking like she is making an excuse

Carrie Noduty: Being in charge of a whole group is too much responsibility for me. I have

enough responsibilities at home taking care of my alcoholic. My plate is

already full.

[Sit down and freeze]

Noah standing and speaking emphatically

Noah Boo-Boo: I suppose, though...I could learn...I guess... But still, I'm bound to make

mistakes. For one thing, all those acronyms are so confusing! GR, DR, LDC, AIS, AWSC, WSO—I'll never get all that straight! Or what if I accidentally break a Tradition? Or break one of those Links of Service? I don't even know what in the heck those are! I could be breaking one right now, and not even

know it!

[Sit down and freeze]

Vera standing and still whining

Vera Success: Success is too much work.

[Sit down and freeze]

Otto standing and progressively getting more upset

Otto Thyme: And I don't want it to interfere with home life either! What if I get involved

and it turns out to be more than I can handle? What if I can't do what I said I

could? Everyone will be disappointed in me! I'll feel just awful.

[Sit down and freeze]

Cat standing and speaking hysterically

Cat Tastrophy: I have never done that job and I am sure that I cannot learn how to do it. I

don't even have enough time in Al-Anon. Don't you need like 10 or 15 years in Al-Anon to be a District Rep? Everyone will see that I can't do anything right and I will just want to sink into the floor and disappearrrrrrrr......

[Sit down and freeze]

Vera is standing and still whining

Vera Success: What if I lose a healthy sense of humility if people start looking to me for

guidance? What if one day I don't have all the answers I thought I once

had?

[Sit down and freeze]

Noah paces and speaks in an emphatic voice and gestures with his arms

Noah Boo-Boo: I just hate making mistakes, HATE it. It brings up all those old feelings of

shame, and guilt, and not being good enough. I've made so many mistakes in my life! Do I really want to voluntarily put myself in a situation where I am almost guaranteed to make more? And especially, in front of my program friends? I'm not entirely sure, but I think they like me right now. What if I

make a mistake and they think I'm incompetent? What if they are

disappointed in me? [Sit down and freeze]

Otto stands and speaks with great sadness

Otto Thyme: I've let people down in the past when I couldn't honor a commitment, and it

made me feel so ashamed. I don't want to commit to do something if it's

going to make me feel bad!

[Sit down and freeze]

Vera stands and speaks in a whining voice

Vera Success: What if I succeed at my job one day and then fail at it the next day? It's

better to not succeed at all. Then I won't feel guilty for letting everyone

down.

[Sit down and freeze]

Cat stands and speaks hysterically

<u>Cat Tastrophy:</u> No this is too stressful. I am certainly not ready I can't believe that

you are asking me to do this! I am so afraid of FAILING!!!

[Sit down and freeze]

Carrie stands and speaks with much emotion

Carrie Noduty: More responsibility means I have more chances to mess things up and make

mistakes. That's too much for me to handle.

[Sit down and freeze]

Vera standing and whining

Vera Success: In my past, doing a job well and being successful meant having to sacrifice

my own happiness. I'm in Al-Anon to find my own happiness, not to

sacrifice it.

[Sit down and freeze]

Otto standing and speaking emphatically

Otto Thyme: But what if I made just a small commitment, one that I was sure I could

honor, one that doesn't require much time? If I put just a toe in the water, will it be enough? Or will I get sucked in, with people wanting me to do more and more jobs, and make more and more commitments? Will I be able

to say no? How can I say no when my program tells me to say yes?

[Sit down and freeze]

The Narrator moves back to front of stage

Narrator: Now, fellow business meeting attendees, what are your fears about doing

service and what gifts do you think you would receive if you worked through

that fear and gave back to the fellowship?

You are all holding numbers. Please go to the designated spot for your

number.

(After group discussion) Hello Business Meeting Attendees! Your Group

Representative would like to hear your answers!

The Group Rep stands and speaks to each group spokesperson

Group Rep:

So, what do you all think about the open service positions? Aren't you just extremely excited! Do you have any questions? How about you, Cat, what do you think about possibly becoming a District Representative? [Wait for spokesperson to answer]

And you, Vera, how do you feel about becoming the Public Outreach Coordinator?

[Wait for spokesperson to answer]

Carrie, have you given the job as Institutions Coordinator any consideration yet?

[Wait for spokesperson to answer]

How about that Alateen Sponsor position? Are you ready, Otto, to get your feet wet?

[Wait for spokesperson to answer]

And last, but not least. Noah, is the District Chair job for you? [Wait for spokesperson to answer]

WHAT TO DO AFTER THE SKIT IS PRESENTED

Directions for Activity after the Skit

We printed Want Ads for each service position, folded each sheet in half, and placed them standing up on our tables to decorate the tables.


We gave each participant a number (1 through 5) as they checked in to the workshop. We put on the skit at the beginning of the workshop. We then broke up into groups according to the number the participants were given when they checked in. They gathered at a circle of chairs corresponding to their assigned number. There they found copies of the *Facing the Ghosts of Our Past* worksheets dealing with Fear, as well as the handout *Gifts: In Giving, We Receive*. We assigned a different fear to each number, so each group was dealing with a different fear. We asked them to discuss their fear and answer the questions on the worksheet. We also asked them to pick a spokesperson for their group.

After about 20 minutes we asked everyone to come back together as one group, to share about their fears, and to answer whether or not they were going to take a Service Position that had been discussed with them in the skit. We asked them to also discuss a gift they would receive by taking this position.

After this was done we finished the workshop with the handout, *Reaching Out to Others* and discussed the questions on that handout.



GIFTS

Gifts: In Giving, We Receive

- A New View of Recovery "Our Al-Anon triangle has three sides: Recovery through the Steps, Unity through the Traditions, and Service through the Concepts. If you aren't taking advantage of all three sides of this triangle, you may be cheating yourself." pg. 9
- Being Willing "I never had any doubts about my capabilities, because I'd been told repeatedly, 'You don't have to be perfect just willing.'" pg. 15
- Replacing Isolation with Community "Practicing the Twelfth Step has given me a golden opportunity to look beyond my isolation and to begin following the guidance of a Higher Power in my daily life. When I look for what's wanted and needed at a meeting, I open the door to a deeper experience of using my will to do the will of a Higher Power." pg. 13
- Learning Trust "Seeing new members apply Al-Anon principles reminds me that this program works, and that the guidance of a Higher power can work miracles. Complete strangers have risked trusting me to introduce them to Al-Anon. By their actions they have encouraged me to trust myself." pg. 14
- Learning to Do the Footwork "As I join in maintaining a program that has spread around the world, I get a sense of hope for my own life's possibilities. I see a program that is the tangible result of members like myself doing footwork with a spiritual orientation, seeking to translate a Higher Power's guidance into practical action." pg. 25
- A Lesson in Detachment "Service was about encouraging his own recovery, and he gave himself permission to limit his activities to what felt challenging but not overwhelming. His attitude also conveyed that he didn't feel responsible for anyone else's recovery..." pg. 27
- A Lesson in Acceptance "I was able to focus on common tasks without being distracted by individual differences in personality or opinion. With gratitude, I noticed that those around me seemed to concentrate on simply doing the best they could without glorifying their successes or justifying their failures." pg. 28
- Letting Go of Perfectionism "Increasingly, I see participation and service not as ways of perfecting my abilities or knowledge, but as ways of learning to accept my imperfect performance." pg. 29
- Putting a Spiritual Awakening into Practice "With the help of a Power greater than myself, I now feel an appreciation for life. The Twelfth Step suggests that I share this feeling with others, and I've done my best to do that." pg. 31
- Clearer Communication "I learned that people are more willing and open to hear my
 response after I have listened to them without interruption. I learned to ask
 whether my response was wanted or if a suggestion about tools to apply to a
 problem would be welcome." pg. 17
- Increased Self-esteem "Service has done more for my self-esteem than anything else in
 my life, and it has given my many Al-Anon friends all over the state." pg. 20
- Learning to Take Risks "Service helps me stretch my boundaries. Taking risks helps me grow, and Al-Anon is a safe place to do just that: take a risk and grow....The rewards of service have been worth the risks." pg. 18
